

	Geographical coverage	Region(s) and country(ies)
Methodologi-	Data gathering	Which data sources are used in the study?
cal approach	Description & analysis	Which methodological approaches are used to describe and/or analyse the commons under study?
	Research questions	What are the paper's research questions?
	Conceptual framework	Are the authors referring to a specific conceptual framework?
Conceptual	Function	Which social function do the authors assign to the commons?
approach	Autonomy	How do the authors conceive the commons in relation to states, markets and civil society?
	Motivation(s)	Why is the author using the concept/framework of the "commons"
Scale of analysis	Unit of analysis	What is the unit of analysis in the study? E.g. "commons", individuals, neighborhood, city, sector
	Level of analysis	What is the primary level of analysis in the study? (micro meso, macro)
Operationali- zation	Empirical focus	Which aspect of the commons is prioritized in the analysis? E.g. resource, community, rules.
	Resource	Which resource(s) are considered central to the 'commons' under study, and what are its characteristics
	Community	How is the community defined and approached by the author? What are its main characteristics?
	Rules/practices	Which types of rules and practices are identified by the authors?
	Property relations (tenure)	Which forms of property relations for land and housing are identified by the authors? Does it play a central role in their analysis?
